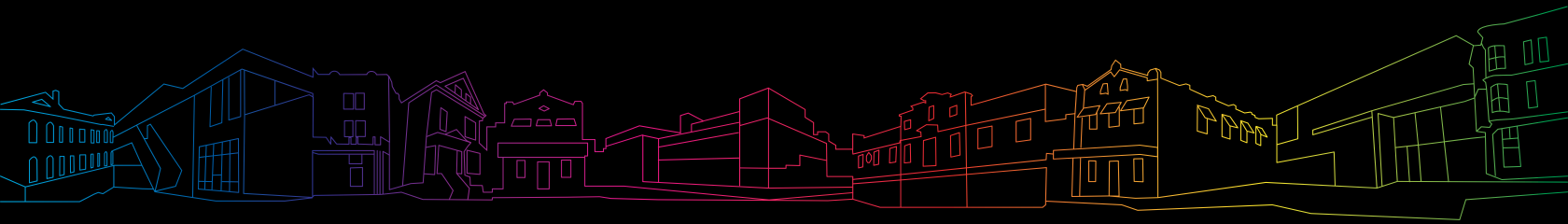

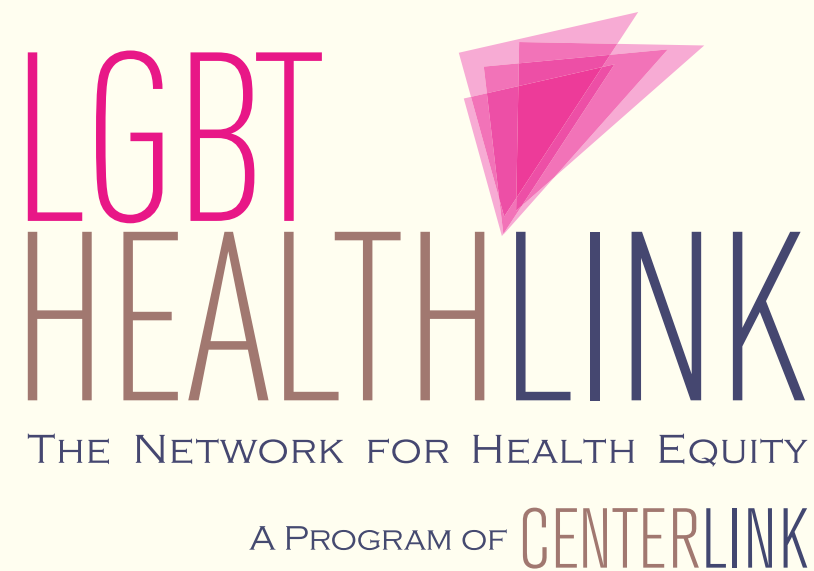

NETWORK GROWTH

- » Increased network membership by 71% in 2018 with over 1148 network members
- » In 2018, our website had over 18,805 pageviews, and 776 wellness resources downloads and health related videos viewed
- » By the end of 2018 our social media had over 15,500 Facebook members, 4100 Twitter followers, and a new Instagram page



RESOURCES AND EDUCATION

- » Provided annual E-Summit to LGBTQ+ community centers, public health, and healthcare systems offering 9 educational sessions with a total 2,233 registrants and 566 attendees -an increase of 21% from previous year
- » LGBT HealthLink distributed free customized Pride event materials and resources to 172 LGBTQ+ community centers



TRAINING AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

- » Provided ongoing technical assistance to increase capacity of LGBTQ+ centers to include health and wellness programming and funding to more than 30 LGBTQ+ center members
- » Provided training to 500 health care professionals on LGBTQ+ cultural competency
- » Trained 29 state departments of health on strategies to include SOGI questions on data sets at the national and state levels



PARTNERSHIPS

- » Facilitated connections between departments of health and LGBTQ+ community centers in 18 states to increase community collaboration, capacity, and funding to provide local interventions within LGBTQ+ communities
- » Sub granted over \$75,000 in funding to LGBTQ+ community centers to engage LGBTQ+ individuals to accelerate research and improve health



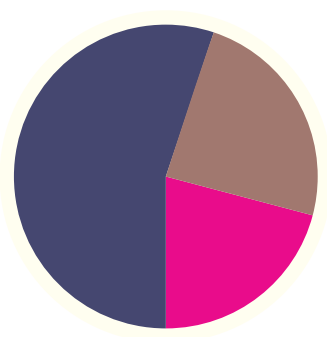

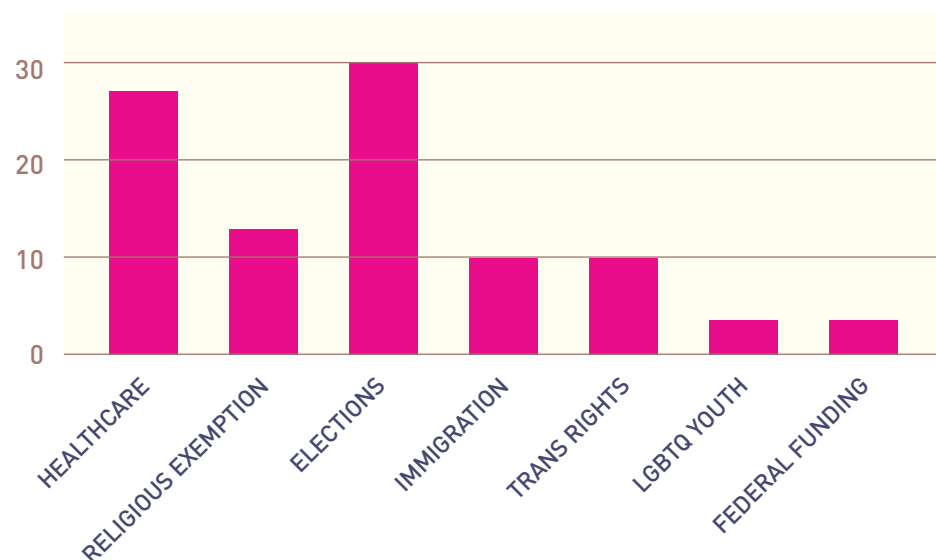
Open To All - AUG 2018 » Over 60 LGBTQ Community Centers join the coalition, encouraging local business partners to support nondiscrimination protections.

A look at MEMBER CENTER HIGHLIGHTS in 2018

THE LOFT CELEBRATES 35TH YEAR DURING 2018 LGBT PRIDE FESTIVAL

Outer, Louder and Prouder! That's how The LOFT LGBT Community Services Center in White Plains celebrated Westchester's thriving and supportive LGBT community with its annual LOFT Pride Event 2018.

Organizers said that, while the day was fun, spirited and joyful, there was also a call for renewed activism and a reminder that pride was born of adversity.

JASMYN BREAKS GROUND FOR NEW SERVICE CENTER FOR JACKSONVILLE'S HOMELESS YOUTH

ASMYN, the Jacksonville Area Sexual Minority Youth Network, kicked off a \$700,000 building renovation project that will help the city's growing number of homeless young people.

The Youth Safety Net Resource Center will be part of JASMYN's partnership with two other nonprofits, Youth Crisis Center and Changing Homelessness Inc., to meet service needs of homeless youth ages 18 to 24, many of whom are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or questioning.

"The center will enable us to really focus on ... being the 'front door' for homeless youth," said JASMYN CEO Cindy Watson, and give them a safe "place to land."

THE SOURCE LGBT+ CENTER NAMED NONPROFIT OF THE YEAR

The Source LGBT+ Center, an advocacy group serving Tulare and Kings counties, was named Nonprofit of the Year by the Tulare Kings Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.

The Source has served over 3,000 in its nearly three years of operation.

NEW MULTI-SERVICE LGBT CENTER OPENS IN LONG ISLAND CITY

A new LGBT center opened its doors in Long Island City in a ribbon-cutting ceremony attended by multiple state and city officials.

The Queens LGBT Community Center, or the Q-Center, is part of the larger LGBT Network, a group that started on Long Island 25 years ago. The group serves members of all ages from the LGBT community of Long Island and Queens through their multiple centers, with the Long Island City location as their fourth.

GUILFORD GREEN'S LGBTQ COMMUNITY CENTER OPENS

Dozens gathered to celebrate the opening of the long-awaited LGBT center in Greensboro. The center, which spans about 1,300 square feet, is a part of the Guilford Green Foundation and is housed inside the GGF office, tucked away on the second floor of a building off West Bessemer Avenue.

"This is a true community center," said Jennifer Ruppe, who is both the center and GGF's executive director. "We're a good first place to call if you need anything."

Bert Davis Jr., who grew up in Greensboro as a gay man, notes the importance of having a safe space specifically for the LGBTQ community.

"The center gives people the support they need, and knowing that it's here sends a signal," Davis Jr. said. "It makes Greensboro a better place to live."

GOOGLE PLEDGES FUNDS TO NYC LGBT CENTER FOR STONEWALL COMMEMORATION

Google committed a million dollars to help commemorate the Stonewall Rebellion, according to Gay City News NYC. The tech corporation announced the donation at the start of Manhattan's Pride Week.

The money will go to the LGBT Community Center, sources say. The Center plans to "develop oral histories and other narratives related to the Stonewall Rebellion of 1969 that can be preserved and disseminated in digital formats."

SAN MATEO COUNTY PRIDE CENTER -CREATING A WELCOMING HOME FOR ALL

In the 52 weeks since the San Mateo County Pride Center opened its doors, the community-oriented hub has hosted countless community meetings, dozens of events and more than 2,000 visitors at its location at 1021 S. El Camino Real in San Mateo.

Ever since Program Director Lisa Putkey was hired in January of 2017 to bring to life a range of services uniquely tailored to the LGBTQ community and its allies at the center, she has had her head down in planning for the space and LGBTQ+ programs offered there.

"A year ago, none of this existed," she said, noting her amazement at the sheer number of community organizations and residents who have reached out to center staff in the last year. "I think we've become such a staple, I can't imagine us not existing."

AFRICAN-AMERICAN COUNSELORS AT THE CENTER ON HALSTED EDUCATE AND ENLIGHTEN THE BLACK LGBTQ COMMUNITY

The Center on Halsted, located in Lakeview neighborhood, is the Midwest's most comprehensive community center dedicated to advancing community and securing the health and well-being of the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer (LGBTQ) people of Chicagoland. More than 1,000 community members visit the Center every day.

Joanna Thompson is the Community Outreach & Engagement Coordinator. She manages outreach campaigns to increase education and awareness of LGBTQ violence prevention and intervention strategies.

"I'm Black and half Latina; I think a lot of [Black] people don't acknowledge the fact that we can even be an LGBTQ community."

The Center's U4U program educates, empowers, and provides mentorship and peer support to HIV+ youth ages 13-24 who are African-American & Latino.

OUT MEMPHIS TO PROVIDE HOUSING FOR HOMELESS LGBT YOUTH

It's a vacant lot now but the property on Southern Avenue in Cooper-Young will soon take on a new look.

Staff at Out Memphis - an organization providing resources for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender individuals - has plans on the drawing board to build transitional housing for homeless LGBT youth.

It's called the Metamorphosis Project.

"We started it about four years ago and it has a couple of pieces to it," said Stephanie Reyes, the director of youth services. "The goal is to help youth 18-24 who are LGBT and experiencing homelessness, move toward independence and get off the streets."

UTAH PRIDE CENTER OPENS NEW FACILITY IN SALT LAKE CITY

A new facility in Salt Lake City is now the much-anticipated home of the Utah Pride Center.

The new facility will be a place the LGBTQ community can finally call their own. A place the Utah Pride Center says they can now grow their programs and facilitate the growing LGBTQ community with meeting spaces and areas for groups to gather.

WHO IS SERVED BY LGBT COMMUNITY CENTERS?

In 2018 the sixth biennial report surveying LGBT community centers across the United States was co-authored by CenterLink and the Movement Advancement Project. The 2018 LGBT Community Center Survey Report: Assessing the Capacity and Programs of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Community Centers, surveyed 128 LGBT community centers from 40 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico.

This report is crucial to increasing understanding of the role that community centers play in the LGBT movement, in serving LGBT people, and in broader communities across the United States. CenterLink distributed copies of this report to each member of Congress to highlight the vital services centers provide to so many people. In September of 2018, MAP and CenterLink released companion reports focused on computing resources and centers' engagement in policy advocacy.

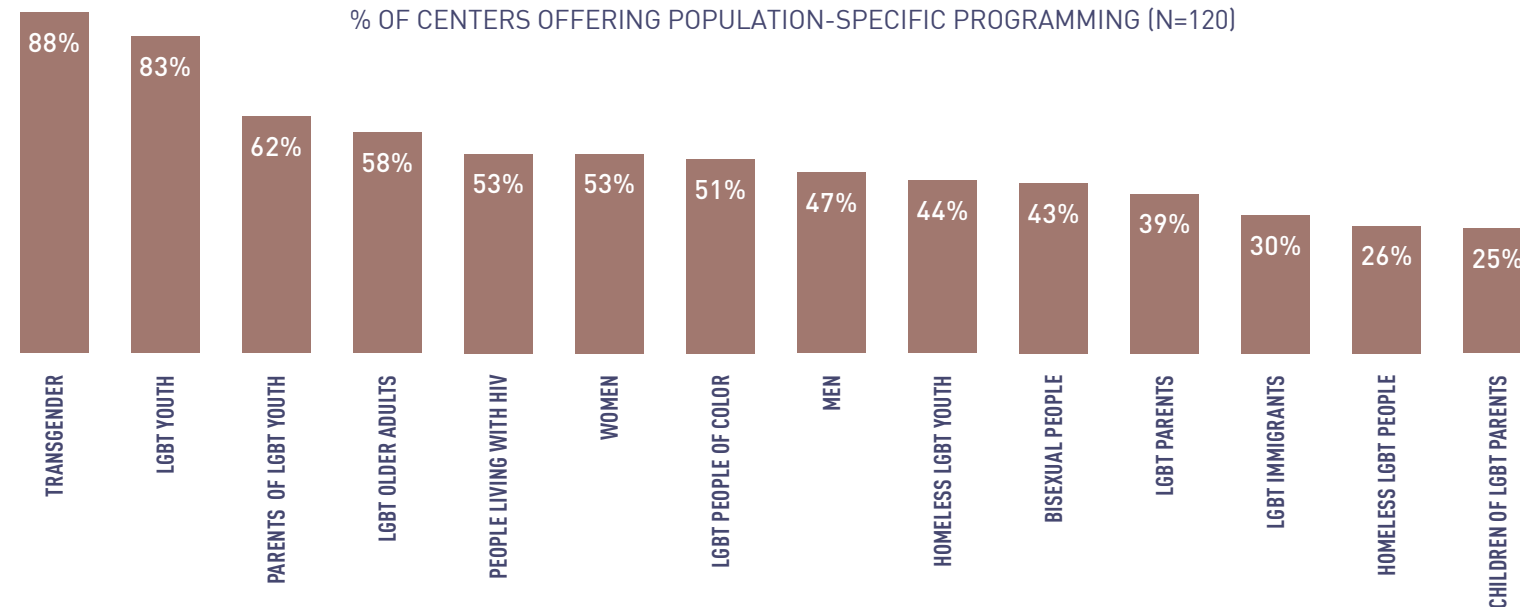
